Dufferin County Scholarship Program

The County of Dufferin is introducing an annual scholarship

Scholarship Streams

- Trades/apprenticeship programs

Eligibility Criteria

All applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Be accepted to a post-secondary institution or training program
 - Be nominated by current high school

Application Process

All applicants will be required to submit the following information:

- Completed application form including a 300 word
- essay
- Transcripts from Grades 11 and 12

Double Hatter Firefighter Issue in the Media

Issue: Professional firefighters as volunteer firefighters during their free time.

Yesterday, this issue was profiled in a front page Globe and Mail story about a firefighter who is taking on the union's actions as relates to 'double hatting'. 'Double hatting' is forbidden by the International Association of Fire Fighters and its Ontario union, The Ontario Professional Fire Fighters Association. Over the years, union charges have been brought against individuals who are double hatters and as a result, generally stop their involvement as a volunteer. Double hatters want to protect family, friends and the community where they live and are an important backbone of fire services within smaller municipalities and its loss proves challenging. Many double hatters were volunteer fire fighters before becoming salaried professionals.

Tom Hunse, a Toronto professional fire fighter for 22 years and a 26 year volunteer with Innisfil Fire Services and his union, is demanding that since he has not stopped his volunteer work that he be fired from his Toronto job. Mr. Hunse is taking a principled stand – that how he uses his free time is his to determine. Yesterday's Globe and Mail and other major news outlets are now covering his story. The public's reaction is that Hunse and other double hatters should be able to use their skills and knowledge in their free time in his own community without repercussion. An arbitration hearing is set for later this year that would deal with his permanent employment status with the City since he is no longer a member in good standing and only Association members in good standing are able to be members of the full-time bargaining unit.

Mr. Hunse has filed a Duty for Fair Representation Application with the Ontario Labour Relations Board against the Toronto Professional Fire Fighters Association. The "duty of fair representation" provisions of the *Labour Relations Act* stipulate that a trade union shall not act in a manner that is arbitrary, discriminatory or in bad faith in representing employees.

AMO has requested intervener status as this matter affects many municipal governments and the double hatters that work. This is a matter of fairness and personal liberty as fire fighters should be able to use their free time as they wish to without reprisal or interference. These volunteers should be supported, not pressured for wanting to protect their neighbours in their home communities. The union does not object to full time firefighters working other jobs which many do.

What is the solution to this threat? A simple change to provincial law would prevent this type of union interference. To our knowledge, every Canadian province has such protection, except for Ontario and Newfoundland. It is time for Ontario to give our volunteer firefighters the same freedom and protection that other employees in Ontario enjoy, as well as those fire fighters everywhere else in the nation.

Attached is a draft council resolution your council may wish to pass that asks the Ontario government to provide this protection to double hatter firefighters who want to serve their home communities in their spare time.

As mentioned, double hatters are worried about being threatened with job loss and municipal governments have been watching this matter closely. If you feel your municipality is vulnerable, please let us know.

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Draft Council Resolution to Support Double Hatters' rights

WHEREAS the training and certification of professional firefighters is established and mandated by the Province of Ontario under the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997;

AND WHEREAS it is the responsibility of municipalities to establish fire departments and appoint fire chiefs to provide fire protection services as they determine may be necessary in accordance with their needs and circumstances;

AND WHEREAS many Ontario municipalities rely on both full time and volunteer firefighters in order to provide fire protection;

AND WHEREAS the International Association of Fire Fighters ("IAFF") Constitution prohibits full time firefighters from volunteering as firefighters in another municipal jurisdiction (i.e. "Double Hatting");

AND WHEREAS the IAFF's stance on Double Hatting is specifically prohibited by legislation in almost all provinces in Canada and much of the United States;

AND WHEREAS a volunteer firefighter in the Innisfil Fire and Rescue Service is challenging the IAFF ban on Double Hatting and their expulsions from that union because of his desire to continue volunteering while being employed as a full-time firefighter in another jurisdiction;

AND WHEREAS the right of individuals to use their free time in service of their community is a fundamental right in a free, open and democratic society.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of _______ requests that the Province of Ontario amend the *Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997* with respect to salaried firefighters who also work as volunteer firefighters, such that if a person is denied membership in an association of firefighters, is expelled or disciplined by the association or engages in reasonable dissent within the association in connection with this kind of dual role, the association is not permitted to require the employer to refuse to employ the person as a salaried firefighter, terminate his or her employment as a salaried firefighter or refuse to assign the person to fire protection services.

Please be advised that at its meeting held Tuesday, August 26, 2014 the Council of The Township of Greater Madawaska adopted the following resolution:

PROTECTION OF PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ACT, 2104 (BILL 83)

WHEREAS Bill 83, Protection of Public Participation Act, 2014, being "An Statutory Powers of Procedure Act in order to protect expression on matters of public interest" (hereinafter "Bill 83"), was introduced into the Provincial Legislature in June 2013;

WHEREAS Bill 83 was introduced by the government out of concern that Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation (SLAPP), being lawsuits brought before the court by one party against another party or individual as a tactic for silencing or intimidating the other party, are having a chilling effect on public participation on contentious matters of public interest in Ontario;

WHEREAS Bill 83 is intended to protect persons from being subjected to legal proceedings that would stifle their ability to speak out on public issues or promote, in the public interest, action by the public or any level of government;

WHEREAS the ability to engage in public participation forums is the foundation of a democratic society;

WHEREAS there exist a number of high profile environmental issues in Township of Greater Madawaska that are of public interest and that have generated a great deal of debate in the community;

WHEREAS Council is of the opinion that public participation in matters of public interest ought to be encouraged and not discouraged through tactics such as strategic lawsuits against public participation;

WHEREAS provision is made in Bill 83 to amend the Courts of Justice Act for such SLAPP legal proceedings to be dismissed at an early stage and for defendants subjected to such proceedings to be indemnified for

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incurred costs in such proceedings with the potential for additional damages to be awarded in appropriate circumstances;

WHEREAS provision is made in Bill 83 to amend the Libel and Slander Act to state that any qualified privilege that applies in respect of an oral or written communication on a matter of public interest between two or more persons who have a direct interest in the matter applies regardless of whether the communication is witnessed or reported on by media representatives or other persons;

WHEREAS provision is made in Bill 83 to amend the Statutory Powers Procedure Act to provide that submissions for a costs order in a proceeding must be made in writing, unless the tribunal determines that to do so is likely to cause a party to the proceeding significant prejudice;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of The Township of Greater Madawaska advise the newly elected Premier of the Province of Ontario, the Honorable Kathleen Wynne, Renfrew County MP's and MPP's, party leaders and all Ontario municipalities of its support for the Protection of Public Participation Act, 2014 and request that Bill 83 be re-introduced forthwith in the Legislature;

THAT the Association of Municipalities of Ontario be requested to support this resolution.

Keep ATVs out of rivers and streams

Utopia, Ontario, September 23, 2014 – The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA) is reminding all-terrain vehicle (ATV) drivers to keep out of area rivers and streams.

Member Municipalities

Last weekend near the Village of Glencairn, a group of anglers were shocked to see a number of ATVs coming down the middle of the Mad River. The ATVs sped along the river and then climbed the bank into the Glencairn Conservation Area causing significant damage.

"There is never a good time to travel with a motorized wheeled vehicle in a waterway as fish habitat destruction is inevitable," said Byron Wesson, NVCA's director of land operations and stewardship services. "This time of year is particularly sensitive for fish as it is spawning season for Chinook salmon, brown trout and brook trout. These fish species provide important recreational fishing opportunities which contribute to our local economy."

ATV drivers caught and convicted of riding in a waterway may face fines of \$15,000 to \$1 million under the Federal Fisheries Act.

"Most ATV drivers are respectful of the natural environment and other trail users," adds Wesson. "It is unfortunate that not everyone shows the same level of awareness and care."

Dear Minister McMeekin:

It is supported by a dynamic business climate that thrives on innovation, creativity and partnerships to foster greater prosperity. And it is reflected across all of our government, in every area, and will extensively inform our programs and policies.

As we move forward with our plan to grow the economy and create jobs, we will do so through the lens of fiscal prudence. Our 2014 Budget reinforces our commitment to balancing the budget by 2017-18; it is essential that every area adheres to the program-spending objectives established in it. We will choose to invest wisely in initiatives that strengthen Ontario's competitive advantage, create jobs and provide vital public services to our families. The President of the Treasury Board, collaborating with the Minister of Finance, will work closely with you and your fellow Cabinet members to ensure that our government meets its fiscal targets. This work will include examining the methods available to measure housing needs and related metrics, and ensuring that the strategy reflects current research and best practices and our goal to end homelessness.

Improving Land Use Planning

- Undertaking initiatives, as the lead minister for Ontario's one-window land use planning system, that will balance the need to support economic growth, protect the environment and improve the province's social well-being.
- Supporting the development of sustainable, transit-friendly complete communities by amending the Planning Act and the Development Charges Act to
 improve land use planning and encourage smarter growth, with these amendments ensuring respect for local official plans and decision-making,

 eradication of and rapid response to invasive species in Ontario's natural environment.
- Advocating and collaborating with other jurisdictions to address the threat of invasive species. You will present Ontario's concerns at the bi-national and federal level.

Guiding Land Use Planning

- Developing a Far North Land Use Strategy, as required under the Far North Act. The strategy would provide policy guidance on which joint planning teams in the Far North can draw as they develop community-based land-use plans.
- Working with the Minister of Northern Development and Mines and the Minister of the Environment and Climate Change to support robust and comprehensive environmental assessments and planning related to projects in the Ring of Fire region.

Managing Aggregates

• Engaging with stakeholders, Aboriginal communities and other concerned ministers to address the recommendations of the Standing Committee on General Government's Report on the Review of the Aggregate Resources Act. You will also bring forward recommended regulatory and legislative changes to improve the Aggregate Resources Act.

Strengthening Biodiversity

Supporting the Biodiversity Strategy. You will continue to work with other ministers and partners to advance measures aimed at further strengthening
and protecting Ontario's biodiversity.

Protecting Wetlands

• Working with other ministers, municipalities and partners to conduct a review of Ontario's broader wetland strategy. Your goal is to strengthen wetland policies and stop the net loss of wetlands.

Implementing the Endangered Species Act

• Implementing the Endangered Species Act. I ask that you continue to implement the act in a way that protects and promotes the recovery of species at risk in Ontario.

We have an ambitious agenda for the next four years. I know that, by working together in partnership, we can be successful. The above list of priority initiatives is not meant to be exhaustive, as there are many other responsibilities that you and your ministry will need to carry out. To that end, this mandate letter is to be used by your ministry to develop more detailed plans for implementation of the initiatives above, in addition to other initiatives not highlighted in this letter.

I ask that you continue to build on the strong relationships we have with the Ontario Public Service, the broader public sector, other levels of government, and the private, non-profit and voluntary sectors. We want to be the most open and transparent government in the country. We want to be a government that works for the people of this province — and with them. It is of the utmost importance that we lead responsibly, act with integrity, manage spending wisely and are accountable for every action we take.

I look forward to working together with you in building opportunity today, and securing the future for all Ontarians.

AMO Report to Member Municipalities:

Highlights of the September 2014 Board Meeting

To keep members informed, AMO provides updates on important issues considered at regular AMO Board of Directors' meetings.

Today's meeting was the first Board of Directors meeting for the nine new members who were elected at the August AMO conference. A high-level board orientation was provided prior to the Board's business agenda. Highlights of the September 2014 Board meeting include:

FCM - 2015 Federal Election Strategy Platform:

Brock Carleton, FCM Executive Director, and Carole Saab, FCM Acting Director of Policy and Government Relations, provided an overview of the FCM "Hometown Champion" campaign as part of the awareness-building and support for advancing municipal governments' interests was presented along with a draft-proposed 2015 Federal Election strategy for feedback and comments. This generated a good, wide-ranging discussion which will be considered as the strategy is finalized by the FCM Board later this year. Canadians want to see all levels of government cooperate to make our hometowns stronger. Become a Hometown Champion today – see <u>https://www.fcm.ca/home.htm</u> and sign up today. AMO will continue to work with FCM on how to evolve the national election strategy to Ontario.

AMO's 2013 Gas Tax Fund Annual Expenditure Report:

The Board approved AMO's 2013 federal Gas Tax Fund (GTF) Annual Expenditure Report and Compliance Audit for submission to Infrastructure Canada. In 2013 municipalities invested \$517 million from the GTF into 1,600 projects worth more than \$4.7 billion. Full details are contained in the report, which will be posted online shortly. Municipal Hazardous and Special Waste: MHSW Phase 1 and Phase 2 Updates:

The Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) Phase 2 funding to municipalities ends on October 1. MOECC has expected that stewards would organize and undertake a voluntary program for municipally collected materials. This approach has resulted in loss of targets, unclear recycling standards, fragmentation, loss of payment for some municipal costs, and lack of access for more northern, remote, or rural areas. AMO will be raising these serious concerns with the Minister as part of the overall costly and environmentally challenging situation of waste and diversion generally in terms of municipal role and responsibility.

The Phase 1 MHSW discussions regarding a new agreement with Stewardship Ontario have begun. Matters being proposed include amending the agreement to clarify how materials moved to an Industry Stewardship Plan (ISP) would be handled. As well, there is discussion about reducing the number of audits, in particular for materials such as pesticides which are declining and "orphaned" (no Steward to pay for the recycling).

Provincial Funding Consultation: Cycling Infrastructure:

The provincial budget included \$10 million for cycling infrastructure over three years and \$400,000 for cycling training. The Ministry of Transportation is now consulting on how to design the programs for this funding. The Board is recommending that MTO pursue a program design that has a broad scope of eligible funding categories; promotes flexibility for municipalities to access funds in various stages of incorporating cycling in the planning process; recognizes established municipal cycling training programs; and ensures that interested community groups can also apply for training delivery funding.

MEPCO Update:

The AMO Board was updated on the status of the OMERS Sponsors Corporation Primary Plan Funding Policy (SPDOS) Review, initiated in mid-August by that Corporation. The MEPCO Board provided input to the Statement of Plan Design Objectives and Strategy. We expect the Sponsors Corporation to provide information on the results of its review in the coming month.

The MEPCO Board met with Michael Latimer, OMERS President and CEO, to discuss new directions for OMERS Administration Corporation policy and organizational change, as part of its ongoing dialogue with OMERS leadership. Notes to 2015 OPP Municipal Cost Recovery Billing

Municipal Base Service and Calls for Service Costs

The Base Service and Calls for Service costs are calculated costs of OPP members providing municipal policing services. The costs are determined based on the staffing in detachments and the municipal policing activities performed. Statistical analysis of activity in all detachments is used to determine the municipal policing workload allocation of all detachment-based staff as well as the allocation of the municipal workload between base services and calls for service activity. For 2015 billing purposes the allocation of the municipal workload has been calculated to be 60.1% Base Service and 39.9% Calls for Service. Please refer to *Base Service and Calls for Service Cost Summary* for the total municipal Base Service and Calls for Service 2015 cost calculation.

Base Service

The Base Service costs represent municipal costs related to proactive policing services such as routine patrols, crime prevention, RIDE programs, training, administration, etc. The cost to each municipality is determined by the number of properties in the municipality and the standard province-wide average cost per property. The number of municipal properties is determined based on MPAC data; please refer to the property count definition attached, *Property Count Definition: OPP Municipal Policing Billing Model.* The calculation of the standard province-wide base cost per property is detailed on *Base Service and Calls for Service Cost Summary.*

Calls for Service

The Calls for Service costs represent the municipal costs related to policing services that are typically reactive in nature and usually require a police officer's attendance. A municipality pays a proportionate share of the total cost of municipal calls for service costs calculated for the province. A municipality's proportionate share of the costs is based on weighted time standards applied to the historical calls for service. The municipality's total weighted time is calculated as a percentage of the total of all municipalities.

Overtime

Municipalities are billed for overtime resulting from occurrences in their geographic area and a portion of overtime that is not linked specifically to a municipality, such as training. Municipalities are not charged for overtime identified as a provincial responsibility. The overtime activity for the calendar years 2012 and 2013 has been analyzed, applying the revised billing methodology, and averaged to forecast the 2015 costs. The costs incorporate the estimated 2015 salary rates and a discount to reflect overtime paid as time in lieu. The overtime costs incurred in servicing detachments for shift shortages have been allocated on a per property basis based on straight time.

Court Security

Municipalities with court security responsibilities in local courthouses have been billed court security costs based on the cost of the staff in the servicing detachment required to provide designated court security activities. 2015 costs have been based on 2013 security activity and security requirements specified by detachment staff.

Prisoner Transportation

Prisoner Transport costs have been allocated to municipalities on a per property basis. The total estimated cost of municipal detachment staff providing prisoner transport services across the province has been calculated based on 2013 activities. The standard per property cost was calculated using the total of all OPP-policed municipal properties.

Accommodation

The municipal portion of the cost of provincially-owned detachment facilities has been allocated to municipalities on a per property basis. A standard province-wide rate has been set based on the total calculated municipal detachment costs and the property counts of municipalities requiring detachment facilities. The municipal detachment costs are based on the number of municipal officers and the per officer cost set in the 2014 Municipal Policing Cost-Recovery Formula.

Cleaning Services

Cleaning costs have been allocated to municipalities on a per property basis. The cost of the municipal portion of detachment caretakers and cleaning service contracts has been calculated and prorated based on the property counts of municipalities requiring these services.

Phase-in Adjustment

The municipal cost impacts of the revised municipal billing model will be phased in over a period of five years, 2015 to 2019. The 2015 phase-in adjustment is based on the comparison of the 2015 calculated cost per property to the 2014 forecasted cost per property. See the table below for 2015 phase-in adjustment details.

2014 Forecasted Municipal Policing Costs

For 2015 billing purposes the Municipal Policing Bureau has forecasted 2014 costs by municipality. The issued 2014 Estimated Policing Costs were adjusted for recently observed costing trends and anticipated final cost adjustment. These forecasted costs were required to estimate the 2015 vs 2014 municipal cost impacts resulting from the revised billing model and determination of phase-in adjustments required.

Total Base Service and Call for Service Costs are based on the cost of salary, benefit, support and other direct operating expenses for staff providing policing services to municipalities. Staff is measured in full-time equivalent (FTE) units and the costs per FTE are described in the notes below.

1) Full-time equivalents (FTEs) are based on average municipal detachment staffing levels for the years 2010 through 2013. Contract staff enhancements are excluded.

The equivalent of **100.5 FTEs with a cost of \$14,778,590**, has been excluded from the Base Service and Calls for Service to reflect the average municipal detachment FTEs required for provincially-mandated responsibilities eligible for Provincial Service Usage credit.

Uniform salaries rates are based on weighted average rates for municipal detachment staffing by rank, level and classification. The 2015 salaries were estimated based on the 2014 rates set in the 2011 to 2014 Compensation Framework Agreement between the OPPA and the Ministry of Government Services with an estimated overall general salary rate increase of 1.5% applied.

FTEs have been apportioned between Base Service and Calls for Service costs based on the current ratio, 60.1% Base Service : 39.9% Calls for Service.

2) Support Staff Costs and Other Direct Operating Expenses for uniform FTEs are calculated on a per FTE basis as per rates set in the 2014 Municipal Policing Cost-Recovery Formula.

Calls for Service Billing Workgroup Descriptions

Drugs

Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession

Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, noncriminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2

Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.
Calls for Service Billing Workgroup Description (continued)

Other Criminal Code Violations

The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations

This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

Statutes & Acts

Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

Traffic

Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

Violent Crimes

The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

Security Detail (if applicable)

There currently are no Niche violation codes that map to this work group.

Provincial Service Usage

The revised billing model recognizes all of the detachments that service municipalities (municipal detachments) as one entity supporting each other with investigations, workload pressures and staffing shortages. Provincial Service Usage (PSU) is generated when officers perform provincially-mandated responsibilities requiring them to work outside the municipal detachments or perform certain specialized duties within detachment areas; for example security for a major event such as the G8/G20 Conference. To acknowledge the deployment of municipal detachment officers for PSU related activities, municipal costs have been discounted. A PSU discount rate is applied to the total municipal policing FTEs to reflect the reduction in service provided to all municipalities. The rate is based on a four-year average of the annual rates calculated for 2010 through 2013. Each annual rate has been calculated as 'the total PSU hours for all municipal detachments' divided by 'the total hours worked in municipal detachments' divided by 'the total hours worked in municipal detachments' DSU hours for all municipal detachments' divided by 'the total hours worked in municipal detachments' divided by 'the total hours worked in municipal detachments'. The PSU discount rate applied in 2015 is 3.91%. In total \$14,778,590 (100.5 municipal policing FTEs), has been removed from the costs allocated to municipalities.

Detachment revenue

Revenue collected at detachments on behalf of municipalities has not been included in the forecasted 2014 costs or 2015 billing summary costs. The 2014 revenue owing to municipalities will be included in the final reconciliation of 2014 costs. Any detachment revenue owing to municipalities upon completion of 2015 will be credited to the municipality through a reduction in a 2016 monthly billing amount.

2014 Reconciliation Adjustment

The reconciliation process for 2014 municipal policing costs will be completed in the same manner as in previous years. Upon completion of the year-end reconciliations the phase-in cost adjustments will be recalculated for all municipalities based on the final costs for all municipalities. The determination of the final 2014 costs may change the per property phase-in caps applied in the issued billing. The capped per property rate may be decreased or increased depending on the final year end status of the costs. Rather than adjust the 2015 monthly billings the net impact of the required adjustment will be included in the 2014 year end reconciliation credit or invoice issued. For further details please see the example detailed below.

2015 Year End Adjustment

Upon completion of 2015, municipal costs based on salaries and benefits components may be recalculated to account for variances between estimated and final rates applicable for the year as determined by collective bargain agreements and the Ministry of Government Services revised benefits calculations. The number of municipal detachment FTEs, "base/calls for service" ratio, property counts, municipal calls for service allocation rates, and PSU discounts included in the original calculations of the 2015 billing will remain unchanged. Court Security, Contract Enhancements and Prisoner Transport costs will be recalculated based on actual 2015 data. Any adjustments required as a result of the recalculation of 2015 costs will be included as a Prior Year Adjustment in the 2017 Annual Billing Statement issued in fall 2016 unless other arrangements are requested.

Court Security and Prisoner Transportation Grant

The Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services (MCSCS) has been reviewing the municipal grant allocations for 2015 and 2016. Court Security and Prisoner Transport (CSPT) costs will be partially offset by the finalized grant allocation. The process currently used to distribute the grants is under review in an effort to streamline the system. An option to allow the OPP to issue credits to municipalities for their CSPT grants is under consideration. Municipalities will be advised of any changes to the distribution process.

Municipalities Currently in OPP Policing Service Contract Arrangements with Enhancements

Municipalities currently in policing services contracts with enhancements have been issued two separate billing statements for cost estimation purposes. Statements have been prepared with and without enhancements. Contract enhancements in municipal detachments have been reviewed and estimated under the new billing model methodology. The costs associated with contract enhancements for dedicated court security responsibilities are including in the Court Security costs. Municipalities expressing intent to continue with enhancements upon renewal of their contracts, if applicable, will be billed based upon the enhanced billing statement while

negotiations are being conducted. Once contract arrangements have been finalized a final billing statement will be issued and billing for the year will be adjusted as required.

Municipalities in Group Policing Service Contract Arrangements

Municipalities are allocated police services costs in accordance with their municipal structure and assumed responsibility for policing as dictated by the *Police Service Act s.4*; that is any lower tier, single tier or regional municipality is billed based on the costs allocated to them. If municipalities continue with group OPP Policing Service contract arrangements after December 31, 2014, the costs for the group will be the sum of the cost of contract enhancements and the costs of the individual municipalities.

Municipalities in group policing service contract arrangements that include contract enhancements for FTEs or other direct operating expenses have been issued two separate billing statements. One statement captures the cost of the previously contracted enhancements, allocated to each of the group municipalities based on property counts and the other statement excludes the cost of any enhancements.

For purposes of calculating the phase-in billing adjustment, the 2014 forecasted cost for existing group contract municipalities has been allocated to member municipalities based on the current cost sharing arrangements as provided by the Group.

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The property counts included in the OPP municipal policing bills are comprised of household, commercial and industrial properties. The property counts will be updated annually based on Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC)¹ data. The counts included in the 2015 OPP municipal billing were based upon 2012 year end property counts for 2013 taxation.

Households

Household counts are the number of residential units (RU), farmlands on which a farm residence exists (FRU), and seasonal dwelling units (RDU).

Commercial and Industrial Business Properties

Business property counts are the number of assessment roll numbers in the commercial and industrial realty tax classes (RTC) detailed in Appendix A. The count includes the number of commercial and industrial classifications taxed at the fully occupied tax rates (refer to Realty Tax Qualifier (RTC) descriptions in Appendix B).

Other Property Count Considerations

- Households, commercial and industrial properties on Canadian Forces Bases (CFB) have been excluded, as CFBs have their own police.
- Property counts have been adjusted for municipalities receiving hybrid (OPP and Municipal police) policing services.
- Timeshares are adjusted in household numbers to count the assessment roll numbers as identified by MPAC Property Codes 385 and 386.
- A building with an apartment above a retail store counts as two properties. The upper portion counted as a household property and the lower portion counted as a commercial property.
- There is no distinction made between types of commercial and industrial properties. For example, a single property count would apply to each: a gas station, an office building, a nightclub, or a stadium.
- Commercial properties with multiple units, such as shopping malls count as a single property, regardless of the number of commercial units operating within malls. Similarly, a large industrial property with a small commercial unit attached would be counted as a single property.
- Vacant lands, such as farmland, managed forest, municipal parks, conservation lands, and commercial or industrial vacant lands are not included in the property counts.
- Institutional properties are excluded, with the exception of those with a residential component (e.g. continuum of care seniors facility), which would be captured in the household numbers.

Subject: 2014 NVCA Regulation Mapping Update

RECOMMENDATIONS

That the 2014 Updated Regulation Mapping be approved and that staff be directed to release the final Updated Mapping to NVCA watershed municipalities and stakeholders and implement the next steps as referenced in this report. Furthermore, that staff enter into agreements with two municipalities to pilot the low risk activity/zone approach to assist in streamlining the permit approval process and that staff will report back to the Board of Directors prior to finalizing the streamlining agreement.

Protocol for Updating Section 28 Mapping

The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority maintains mapping in support of the *Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses Regulation, Ontario Regulation 172/06.* Since this mapping was created in 2006, a number of adjustments have been made to the *Regulation Limit* to reflect new information based on:

- Site specific technical studies
- o Refined Engineering Modeling
- o Updated Elevation datasets
- Rigorous QA/QC by GIS and Engineering staff
- o Refined wetland mapping based on field and Ortho interpretations
- Updated watershed boundary to reflect the Order In Council boundary definition including the 5km of jurisdiction into Georgian Bay
- o Updated watercourse layer based on new ortho imagery interpretations and site visits
- o Additional input received from landowners and verified by staff site visits.

A protocol for the mapping update process was established by Conservation Ontario to ensure that Conservation Authorities follow the appropriate process for tracking and recording mapping updates as well as following procedure related to technical review, peer review, public notification and filing with the MNR.

The Mapping Protocol differentiates between "maintenance" of the mapping and "extensive updates". If the changes are deemed "maintenance", the protocol recommends that annual updates to the mapping be formally approved by Conservation Authority members to ensure full knowledge of mapping status. In addition, the protocol recommends that each Conservation Authority adopt a method to track changes and that these changes be recorded in a revision block on each map sheet indicating the date of approval. If the changes are extensive, the protocol requires a Conservation Authority to engage the public in a review of the changes and submit the proposed updates along with a detailed consultation record, a Conservation Authority resolution, and an executive summary of the changes and mapping methodologies to a joint Conservation Ontario/Ministry of Natural Resources Peer Implementation and Review Committee for endorsement.

Maintenance of mapping refers to mapping updates which are minor adjustments and refinements to the *Regulation Limit* based on new technical information and where changes are site specific. Extensive updates are those where new mapping methodologies are proposed that are different than those previously endorsed or where the scope of the mapping update based on the number of property owners affected by the change is sizable.

As per the June 28th 2013, staff report and Board approved recommendations staff proceeded with finalizing the regulation mapping updates as maintenance.

Stakeholder Consultation

While it was not required under protocol to consult with the public, staff supported by the Board, recognized the implications the changes could have and for this reason, exceeded what was required for a maintenance update. The following outlines the consultation process undertaken by staff:

- Municipal staff were given a two month period to review and comment on the draft 2013 mapping; the new mapping was made available to municipal staff in various formats including:
 - NVCA's interactive web mapping site
 - File transfer of the draft GIS layers
 - Custom maps showing regulated areas
- Staff received comments from 12 municipalities; all municipal comments were reviewed in detail by staff and refinements were made to the mapping as per the above noted mapping update protocols
- A press release was distributed to local media outlets regarding the two public open house sessions NVCA hosted on October 10th, 2013 (41 attendees)
- Mapping was made available for public review via our website's interactive mapping prior to the Open House sessions and is still available online today
- Some residents affected by the changes were contacted via mail as per the request of individual municipalities
- NVCA staff met with municipal staff to discuss mapping concerns where requested
- NVCA Staff presented at a previously scheduled municipal public meeting, as requested by municipal staff
- Staff received over 70 comments via email, letter, phone and in person
- Staff worked diligently to examine each area commented on and refinements were made to the mapping where deemed appropriate; staff review included:
 - o Further discussions with property owners and/or municipal staff
 - Desktop data and modeling refinements
 - Site inspections were deemed necessary
 - o Legal consultation with NVCA's solicitor
 - Consultation with the MNR and other Conservation Authorities
- Staff further engaged municipal staff in March and April 2014 on the latest draft mapping and opportunities to streamline the permit approval process using a Low Risk Zone approach see Appendix C, e-mail sent to all Watershed Municipal Planning contacts. In general, the feedback received was positive and supportive of the proposed mapping and streamlining concept.

• On July 11, 2014 staff received support for the implementation and development of the Low Risk Zone concept, from the NVCA Agricultural Advisory Committee.

Updated Mapping

Further to the review undertaken by staff, the total area regulated has changed in several areas. An analysis of the changes between 2006 and the Draft 2014 mapping shows that there has been a 9.67% increase in the amount of land regulated in the watershed. This amounts to 15166 ha. Of that area 8.65% is due to the requirement to include 5 km. out into Georgian Bay, as per the Order in Council, 2136/88, with the remaining 1.02% increase resulting from all other mapping changes listed above. Note the decrease of 4.82% in regulated area between the draft 2013 and the draft 2014 mapping is due to the feedback received in the review process.

Low Risk Zone

In support of the updated mapping, NVCA staff proposed an approach to further streamline our approval process based on municipal and public feedback. An e-mail outlining this concept was provided to our member municipalities and County, planning contacts, seeking their input. (See appendix C) In general, the feedback received was very positive and supportive of the proposed concept. At this time five Municipalities have expressed an interest in further exploring ways to implement this approach. It is estimated that 17,097 ha of land would fall within this Low risk Zone in the NVCA, representing roughly 2,220 parcels of land. This number could increase depending upon the area considered to be low risk in the future. Appendix D provides a summary of the Low Risk/ High Risk areas by Municipality. It also provides a parcel breakdown for two sample municipalities, Clearview and Wasaga Beach. In staff's opinion the large extent of Low Risk Zone throughout the Watershed makes this initiative worth consideration.

The concept consists of streamlining Low Risk proposed development activities by entering into agreements with Municipalities to provide screening at the local level, to provide enhance customer service, and minimize unnecessary work and costs for the landowner, and the NVCA. The following are the two Low Risk Activity and Areas/zones that staff is recommending for initial implementation of this concept:

 Minor development activities (example pool, grain bin, minor accessory structure to be defined further.) in regulated offsets around wetlands beyond 30m and within 120m of non-provincially significant wetlands Existing previously approved developed lots that are outside of hazard areas or other areas of concern

See **Appendix B** for two examples of low risk zones

It is important to note that staff currently review and screen for low or no risk on an individual basis. Requiring the proponent to apply for an individual permit and contact or meet with staff to determine the type of proposed activity and level of risk.

Staff believes that a sizeable portion of currently regulated lands would fall into the Low Risk Zone concept, making it of interest to a great many watershed residents and Municipalities.

The following is a summary of benefits to implementing the above Low Risk Zone approach though Municipal agreements:

- Enhanced customer service by streamlining the review and approval process
- Increased efficiency by integrating Municipal and CA review of low risk activities Provide for more effective protection of people from natural hazards, and protection of the watershed environment
- Full utilization of the best science, technology and expertise of Municipal and NVCA staff
- Enable NVCA staff to focus on more significant, higher risk development applications
- Encourage Municipalities to enter into Planning/ regulations streamlining agreements

Next Steps and Recommendations

The following are the staff suggested next steps and recommendations:

- Upon approval from the Board, staff will remove the reference to "Draft" mapping and release the approved mapping to municipalities as GIS layers as well as update the public interactive web mapping site
- As per the "Protocol for Updates to Section 28 Mapping", document changes and generate new tile maps
- Prepare and release an educational public notice highlighting Ontario Regulation 172/06, mapping updates and other NVCA business through a municipal mail out (i.e. tax notice)
- Establish and implement a low risk zone approach. This implementation would involve amendments to the NVCA Planning Guidelines and revisions to the fee schedule such that applications for select works that fall within the 'low risk zone' which are processed at/by the local Municipalities via an established streamlining agreement would be exempt from normal NVCA permit fees.
- Consult with our NVCA solicitor to ensure the Low Risk Zone approach is implemented, effectively meeting the requirements of the Conservation Authorities Act, Section 28.
- Actively engage with member municipalities to implement the Low Risk Zone approach through amendments to existing MOU's or establishment of new agreements. Including entering into Pilot agreements with two Municipalities within 3 months, to facilitate implementation of this new approach. The Pilots would include at least; establishment of an agreement template, developing implementation protocols, identifying low risk activities, and recommended draft revisions to the NVCA Planning Guidelines, all reviewed by the NVCA Solicitor to ensure legislative compliance.

- Continue public engagement including ongoing communication with the Agriculture community through the newly formed NVCA Agricultural Advisory Committee to discuss NVCA regulatory role and ongoing mapping updates and to seek input for effective implementation.
- Continue updating and maintenance of the regulatory mapping. The mapping is dynamic and as better data becomes available, and models improve, changes to the Regulation Area would be required. In addition observed changes (via Regulation Officers and the planning application process) may require adjustments to the Regulated Area. It is our longer term goal to provide quarterly updates to our Municipal partners and updates to our Public website mapping. In the immediate future, while NVCA develops this newly defined work flow, updates are to be done on a bi-yearly bases.

Applications related to fill will be subject to fill policy guidelines regardless of whether they fall within a low risk zone.

Conclusion

In summary, staff is of the opinion that the mapping is ready for Board approval and for release to our member municipalities and the public. It is important to note that the regulatory mapping is not a static product. It is a dynamic product that will change as new information becomes available. The mapping itself is to be used as a screening tool to aid the public, our municipalities and NVCA staff in flagging areas that may pertain to the written Regulation 172/06. The text of the regulation applies and will supersede the mapping when site specific observations deviate from the mapping.

Staff will continue to seek opportunities to receive comments from the public and municipal staff on an on-going basis. All comments will be subject to review and changes will be made consistent with the established Regulations Mapping update protocols.

Staff have received overall positive support for considering the implementation of a Low Risk Zone approach. At least two Municipalities have expressed interest in advancing this approach in the near term. Staff recommends that if the Board supports the Low Risk Zone approach, that staff implement a pilot agreement, within 3 months, with two Municipalities, to facilitate full implementation to all interested Municipalities, over the next 1 to 2 years.

NVCA staff provide the following status on the regulation mapping update process:

Update Regulation Mapping:

The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA) is pleased to provide you with a link to the latest **draft** updated regulation maps that illustrate the areas regulated within the NVCA's watershed in support of the *Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses Regulation, Ontario Regulation 172/06.*

These updated maps will ultimately replace the previous 2006 mapping that was provided to all member municipalities and is now currently posted to the NVCA website through the NVCA's Interactive Mapping site. The latest **draft** mapping addresses our legislative requirements as well as reflect input we received from our watershed residents, municipal partners and additional site visits. The latest draft mapping can be accessed through the following URL: <u>http://maps.simcoe.ca/NVCA_6422488c-938f-4c58-9b48-a4226323f1d4/</u>

Consultation Process:

As part of the mapping update exercise NVCA staff with support of our Board carried out municipal and public consultation. The following list outlines the key components of the consultation process:

- In July 2013 the initial draft updated mapping was made available to municipal staff in various formats for review and comment.
- Staff received comments from 12 municipalities and where requested NVCA staff met with municipal staff to discuss mapping concerns.
- NVCA hosted two public open house sessions on October 10th, 2013.
- Mapping was made available for public review via our website's interactive mapping prior to the Open House sessions and it continues to be our website
- Staff examined all comments received from the public which in some cases resulted in further discussions with landowners, site visits, and mapping refinements/updates.

Streamlining Permit Approval Process:

The **objective** of streamlining the approval process is to:

- Improve efficiency of permitting process by screening for and establishing a simplified process for low/no risk activities consistent with requirements of the CA Act Section 28, for regulated areas.
- Provide a process/ mapping tool to assist Municipalities and landowners in the screening
 process. To ensure the focus of efforts is placed where there are higher risks/ hazards.
- To work collaboratively with Municipal partners to ensure safe and efficient development occurs.

In support of the updated mapping, NVCA staff is also examining opportunities to further streamline our approval process based on municipal and public feedback. In particular, NVCA staff are proposing to simplify the approval process for minor works such as pools, grain bins, minor accessory structures (<46 sq. m.) and possibly minor house additions (< 50%) in areas of low risk.

The low risk zone for the above noted uses/activities includes areas where there is, based on best available science, minimal or no risk of impact on natural hazards or on natural features. For example:

- Regulated offsets around wetlands beyond 30m and within 120m of non-provincially significant
 wetlands and outside of natural hazards areas, where activities would have low (no) risk such as lands
 currently under agriculture (see attached map).
- Existing previously approved urban lots that are outside of hazard areas or other areas of concern (see attached map).

NVCA staff is proposing to approve these works in the identified areas through a clearance letter process on an individual property basis.

Another option that is being considered is addressing multiple properties in a municipality in a manner consistent with the requirements of Section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act. In the multiple property scenarios the clearance letter would be issued to the municipality and the municipality would be responsible for screening these works. Subject to an agreement between the NVCA and municipality.

We are seeking feedback from our municipal partners on the proposed approaches and your interest in participating in the screening process.

It is staff's goal to bring forward the latest draft mapping along with a streamlined approval process for our Board of Director's consideration in late spring or early summer. We would appreciate any comments you may have on this matter.

of the NVCA BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETINGS No. 10/14 – September 26, 2014

New partnership working to conserve local wetlands

Alexandra Service of Ducks Unlimited Canada presented to the board on the recently established Lake Simcoe Georgian Bay Wetland Collaborative. Ducks Unlimited, NVCA, Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority and the Severn Sound Environmental Association have teamed up to reduce phosphorus and improve water quality in Lake Simcoe and Georgian Bay through wetland conservation. This includes municipal engagement (technical support, policy BMP), research (updated wetlands mapping), and landowner outreach (funding, technical support).

Ms. Service outlined the benefits wetlands offer for flood control, water quality, wildlife habitat and recreation. She highlighted the role wetlands can and will play in mitigating the effects of climate change. Based on her presentation, the board directed NVCA to review the Authority's pond policy in 2015 as it relates to considerations for wetland/habitat projects.

Nature Conservancy of Canada donates 85 acres of Minesing Wetlands to NVCA Lands secured as part of long-term acquisition program

The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) donated 85 acres of land within the Minesing Wetlands to NVCA. More than 10,000 acres in the Minesing Wetlands has been donated by NCC and other partners as part of the Authority's long-standing Minesing Wetland Acquisition Program. The new parcel, consisting primarily of silver maple and black ash swamp, is located between Angus and Brentwood.

Tiffin Tornado Damage Update

The board heard of the continuing clean-up efforts stemming from the tornado that hit the Tiffin Centre in June of this year. Over the last month, volunteers have planted more than 120 large (4') trees on the property. The trail network and public areas are by-in-large re-opened to the public.

NVCA to provide enforcement services under Clean Water Act

Collingwood, New Tecumseth, Mono and Shelburne transfer responsibilities

The South Georgian Bay Lake Simcoe Region Source Protection Plan, invoking powers under Part IV of the *Clean Water Act*, requires that municipalities manage significant threats to drinking water. Municipalities may assume this responsibility, or may transfer it to another public body such as a Source Protection Authority (NVCA serves as the source protection authority for the watershed). At this meeting, the board approved staff to enter into agreements with the municipalities of Collingwood, New Tecumseth,

Mono and Shelburne to provide risk management services under the *Clean Water Act*. Further, the board appointed Ryan Post, NVCA Hydrogeologist, as the Risk Management Official and Inspector for the NVCA, as required by the *Clean Water Act*.

NVCA to participate in new groundwater studies

With approval of the board, NVCA staff will participate in two Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry-funded studies. The first study will look at the effects of barometric pressure and groundwater recharge lag time (how long it takes for water in a stream to move into the aquifer) during periods of drought. The second study will look at the relationship between the rare Hine's Emerald Dragonfly (HED), water levels and water quality. As part of this study, staff will conduct an invasive species survey within HED habitat areas, and identify potential threats to HED or its habitat. Both studies are expected to be completed during the first part of 2015.

NVCA updates areas regulated for flood and erosion hazards

UTOPIA, Ontario (Oct. 6, 2014) – The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority regulates in wetlands and areas adjacent to waterways where flooding and erosion may put people and property at risk. Recently, the NVCA's board of directors approved updates changing the extent of these regulated areas.

"In 2013 and early 2014, NVCA undertook an extensive process to adjust the areas we regulate to reflect the findings from new technical studies, engineering modelling and site visits," said Chris Hibberd, NVCA's planning director. "We also incorporated information gathered by NVCA staff through consultation with municipalities, landowners and other interested parties."

In total, the new limits increase the amount of land regulated by NVCA by 1.02% throughout the watershed. The new limits also include the area along the Georgian Bay shoreline extending 5 km into the lake.

Landowners can see if their property is regulated by NVCA using the interactive map found under "permits and planning" at nvca.on.ca. Turning on the NVCA map layer shows all the areas regulated in the watershed. If a property, or part of a property, is in the regulated area, landowners may require a permit from NVCA for any construction or landscaping project.

NVCA offers free consultations to help property owners determine if their proposed project will require a permit, and if so, what to expect during the permitting process. Landowners are encouraged call NVCA at 705-424-1479 to discuss their plans before they build.

Building Department Reserve Fund:

- 1) Attached is the analysis prepared by the Treasurer on the Building Department Reserve Fund from 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014.
- 2) The reserve fund amount was never \$400K. County Council approved a motion on December 13, 2007 to set the fund at 1 million. I believe that the confusion may have come from a recommendation dated August 6, 2007 from the Dufferin Municipal Officers Association to limit the reserve to \$400K.

Building Permit Information:

- 3) As of Friday October 3, 2014 MPAC has all building permit information to the end of August 2014. We've been working with MPAC closely over the past few months on the new format that MPAC requires. Also see the emails from me and Matthew Stubbs that have been sent to all the municipalities to set the record straight. No municipality is or was going to lose any 2014 assessments due to computer software issues.
- 4) The new software programing is now complete and being tested the week of October 6th.

The Town of Mono is a rural community on the north west fringe of the Greater Toronto Area (GTA). The Town of Mono is a grossly underserviced area in terms of high speed broadband services. Providing high speed broadband service to rural areas is not sufficiently lucrative for commercial operators; hence, they leave municipalities such as the Town of Mono under serviced. Current regulations do not adequately address this problem, allowing vendors to focus too narrowly on those markets they deem profitable, to the detriment of rural Canada. Industry Canada regulations encourages this, allowing vendors to 'pick the low hanging fruit'. This is not acceptable to the Town of Mono.

Further, the New Building Canada Fund grant system, which puts unrealistic conditions on small rural municipalities, ensures that we cannot participate in federal and provincial infrastructure grants for the next 10 years. To this Council and our residents, this seems to be a full assault on rural Canada by the current federal government, to the benefit of urban areas of Canada.

I would like to emphasize the importance of rural Canada to the tourism, agribusiness; and the provision of natural resources, to fuel and sustain the development of the major urban centres in Canada. People and businesses are located in rural Canada, not only in the urban centres. These people and businesses need high speed broadband to access health care, education, customers, and to be competitive with other regions and countries. Under the current and proposed policies, the lack of appropriate internet could lead people to leave rural areas, abandon business opportunities; including agribusiness, tourism, etc., potentially leading to a collapse of the economies of rural Canada.

The current path of the federal government leaves rural Canada not only uncompetitive with other developed countries, but even with many third world countries. Now, with the proposed policy change, it seems that not only does the Federal Government put the needs of big cellular providers above the needs of rural Canadians, but would imply a complete disregard for the health, economy and prosperity of rural Canada. When coupled with the New Building Canada Fund conditions, the Federal Government has ensured that most rural municipalities, such as the Town of Mono, will not have access to federal/provincial funding for the duration of its 10 year rollout, and will continue to fall behind our urban neighbors in internet access.

Here are our recommendations to both the federal and provincial governments.

- That the Federal Government enact, concurrent with the policy being proposed, a policy that would require the benefiting companies and their subsidiaries provide a ubiquitous ultra-high speed broadband service to both urban and rural Canadians.
- 2. Redirect funds from the New Building Canada Fund in support of the above initiative.
- 3. That the provision of ubiquitous ultra-high speed broadband be a priority of both the provincial and federal governments, under the leadership of the federal government, to ensure that Canada does not continue to devolve into a two-class country divided along urban/rural boundaries.
- 4. That the federal and provincial governments establish a Canada Special Broadband Task Force with the cellular and broadband providers, and with rural stakeholders, to determine how best to provide a ubiquitous broadband service for all Canadians, and how to fund that service in a fair and equitable manner.
- 5. That the current proposed policy change not be effected until a new, ubiquitous, urban/rural service is implemented.

Industry Canada has proposed changes that would seriously affect current rural internet service. The process involves reclassifying vast rural areas as "urban" and for all "urban" licenses to be taken away from rural internet service providers even though licenses are in use providing service to people today in rural Ontario. That spectrum would be allocated to cellular phone companies for future use not yet developed.

In effect, this policy change would see many rural communities across Ontario and Canada lose their existing high speed internet service. In our view, this short sighted proposal appears only to benefit the major telecommunication companies and is contrary to the Federal government's priority of providing high speed internet service to rural communities throughout Canada. For rural communities, access to high speed internet services allows them to compete globally. It also enhances economic returns for local businesses as well as attracts businesses and residents to the community.

The ROMA Board feels that this matter deserves the attention of rural communities across the province and urges municipal governments to raise this matter in submissions to Industry Canada. A draft mock-up of a <u>letter</u> is available for your use on the ROMA website to help in crafting your message to the Federal government. Additional information on this matter is also posted on the ROMA <u>website</u>. The turnaround time on these submissions is short. Comments **are due to Industry Canada electronically by** Wednesday, October 8th. If your Council has an existing position on access to rural high speed internet, we urge you to send that along as well.

Thank you for taking the time to respond to this important issue that affects all rural communities across Canada.

Today the Rural Ontario Municipal Association learned that Industry Canada has proposed changes effecting rural Internet service in the *Consultation on Policy Changes in the 3500 MHz Band (3475-3650 MHz) and a New Licensing Process in Rural Areas,* DGSO-003-14, dated August 19, *2014 (the "Consultation Paper").* We are gravely concerned about this proposal.

The Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) is the rural arm of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO). The association is an integral part of AMO and a number of its Executive Members serve on the AMO Board of Directors. Policy, research and advocacy activities are undertaken by ROMA through AMO. Matters which affect rural communities are brought to the attention of the provincial and federal governments.

These comments are in response to the proposals in questions 1, 7 and 8 of the Consultation Paper.

While we share the stated goal of ensuring the best possible high-speed Internet in Ontario's rural regions, the proposals in the Consultation Paper would not have that effect. The proposals, as drafted, take away spectrum in use today to provide Internet service to Ontarians outside of the big cities and gives it to telephone companies for future mobile phone use. If that happens, hundreds of thousands of current residential and business customers in rural Canada will lose their existing high-speed Internet service, including people in our area. Access to internet is the foundation of economic enterprise in rural areas. This proposal is a step backwards for rural Ontarians and not in keeping with the stated goal of increasing Internet access for Ontarians.

The proposed reclassification of the licensed areas would designate vast rural areas as "urban" areas. Once this reclassification happens, the proposal then calls for <u>all</u> the "urban" licences to be taken away from rural Internet service providers (ISPs), even though the licences are in use providing service to people today, and for that spectrum to be given to cellular phone companies for future use with smart phones that have not yet been developed.

We do not support any proposal that ignores the current needs of rural Ontarians by taking away ALL of the spectrum and giving it to cellular companies.

The Consultation Paper states that the "Government of Canada is committed to ensuring that Ontarians benefit from the availability of advanced, competitively priced telecommunications services in all regions of the country" and has a commitment "to extend and enhance broadband Internet services in rural and northern communities in order to meet the continued demand for fixed services in rural areas".¹ However, the proposals in the Consultation Paper do not live up to those promises. Any proposal that would see a large number of rural Ontarians being designated "urban" and having fixed wireless Internet service in their areas shut down does not benefit "all regions of the country". It sacrifices the current needs of rural communities, takes away the economic and social benefits of the Internet from rural residents and undermines all the hard work that rural areas have done to ensure we connect rural residents to high quality Internet services.

We urge the Minister of Industry and Industry Canada to reject the flawed proposals in the Consultation Paper and, at the very minimum, to do no harm – please leave the licences in place for spectrum that <u>is in use today</u> providing service to Ontarians and exempt the licensees that are delivering high speed fixed wireless internet services today from any requirement to depart from this spectrum. Please do not take away Internet service from rural residents.

In accordance with Council's direction at its September 18th meeting and your September 23rd email, I have now reviewed the applicant's latest documentation to determine if it is satisfactory in accordance with paragraph 2 of section 6 of the Township's Protocol for Establishing Telecommunication Facilities. The information provided is substantially improved over previous submissions. This material is satisfactory and the applicant can be notified and instructed to begin the Protocol's public notification and consultation process.

The Site Selection Report and other material submitted with the applicant's August 28th, 2014, letter provide all of the key information required by the Protocol including documentation relating to the proposed 90 metre tower height, simulated views of the tower from the local area, residential land use and property mapping, review of the site in terms of the area's important environmental features and comments from the Conservation Authority. The following summarizes the few aspects that may require clarification or further work during the processing of the application.

- 1. The Site Selection Report indicates that federal agencies will determine the requirements, if any, for the colour of the tower and any light placement on the tower, information referenced in the Protocol. It also indicates that the required applications would be made. The proponent should pursue this with the authorities having jurisdiction in order to provide this information as expeditiously as possible, notwithstanding the NAV Canada deadline for construction within six months of its approval.
- 2. The Report's analysis of the impact on recreational uses did not discuss the small Township park at the corner of Main Street and Sideroad Fifteen. That deficiency was at least partially rectified by one of the photo simulations which showed the view of the Tower as from that intersection.

- 3. Paragraph 11 of section 6 in the Protocol requires assurance from the applicant that appropriate arrangements have been made to dismantle and remove the facility if it is no longer required. Such assurance has not yet been provided but this can be addressed through the processing under the Protocol.
- 4. The Protocol requires a letter from the landowner indicating an intent to enter into a lease agreement to permit the establishment of the proposed facility. That has not yet been provided but the landowners' authorization for the proponent to proceed with the application is a relevant document. This can be addressed during the processing of the application.

I would also add that with some revisions the draft "Letter of Undertaking" as provided by the proponent may be a useful implementation document if Council decides to support the proposal.

Although not directly related to this application, I would suggest that, with the passage of time, the experience gained in processing applications, and the recent implementation of new Industry Canada approval procedures for radiocommunication and broadcasting antenna systems, it would now be appropriate to update the Township's Protocol.

Re: NVCA Permit Application – for the construction of a guyed radio tower and equipment shelter and gravel access road to tower base at Lot 27, Concession 10, 338112 10th Line, Melancthon Township, County of Dufferin.

The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA) has reviewed your application and associated drawing, for the above noted works. In consultation with Industry Canada, it is our understanding that communications towers are federally regulated and we note that a permit from NVCA is not required. However, as a primary land use authority, we provide the following comments:

The area of the proposed tower and part of the access road is within the NVCA regulated area (see attached map). The regulated area includes wetland buffer, watercourse meander and floodplain.

Usually and customarily we would ask that the works be located outside the regulated area where there are portions of the property that are not within the hazard and heritage features, such that wetland interference and flooding/ erosion hazards are avoided. Based on my review the base anchoring the eastern guywire appears to be in very close proximity to the adjacent watercourse. We would request that the propose development maximize setbacks from the existing watercourse. Our standard setback is 30 metres, which would ensure no negative impact to the watercourse.

As a permit is not required, we are submitting a request for a partial refund of \$300.00 as we consider this file a general inquiry, the fee for which is \$200.00.

Home Occupations and On-farm Business Uses

The following comments are provided in response to Council's questions and concerns regarding aspects of home occupations and on-farm business uses and the related zoning controls.

I understand these questions and concerns were prompted by the building permit application submitted on behalf of Mr. Soloman H. Martin for works intended to accommodate a home occupation on a property at 764220 Sideroad 240. I reviewed the initial proposal for this use to determine its compliance with the Zoning By-law's applicable home occupation provisions. My detailed comments indicating apparent compliance with those provisions were provided with my September 4th email.

It appears that Council's three principal questions/concerns can be summarized in the following questions.

- 1. Can an applicant for a home occupation be required to apply instead for an on-farm business use?
- 2. Can an applicant apply for a home occupation and an on-farm business use on the same property?
- 3. Can a landowner start a business as a home occupation and then apply for an on-farm business use, presumably to convert the home occupation into such a business?

Requiring a New Application for a Different Use

It is my opinion that an applicant cannot be required to change an application for a home occupation to one for an on-farm business. If the application meets the Zoning By-law's requirements for a home occupation, it would have to be processed and ultimately approved. That is why Mr. Martin's proposal was immediately reviewed for Zoning By-law compliance.

Conversely, if there is noncompliance with one or more home occupation requirements the application, and the associated development proposal, would have to be appropriately revised or it would be refused. At that point, or at any point in the processing of the original application,

the applicant could reapply for an on-farm business use if they determined that their proposal would comply with the relevant Zoning By-law provisions.

It would be the applicant's decision as to whether or not to proceed with a new application. The Township would be limited to making a decision on the original application and that decision would be based on an assessment of the compliance with the home occupation zoning provisions.

A Home Occupation and an On-farm Business Use on the Same Property

It is my opinion that there is nothing in the Official Plan or the Zoning By-law that would prevent the development of a home occupation and an on-farm business use on the same property, provided each use complied with all applicable planning and zoning requirements. Both are permitted uses and there is no specific prohibition in either planning document preventing the development of more than one type of permitted use on a lot.

Section 4(a) of the Official Plan permits home occupations in addition to a variety of other uses in the Rural designation which is the designation applying to the subject property and to the majority of the lands in the Township. In the Zoning By-law the definition of the term "home occupation" and the provisions of section 3.13 require such a use to be associated with a dwelling including a dwelling in an agricultural zone. There is no other provision, including the requirements of section 4.6 regarding on-farm business uses, that relate to home occupations on lands containing an on-farm business use.

Notwithstanding these components of the two planning documents, the minimum lot size zoning provisions would now prevent this combination of uses on properties smaller than 20.23 hectares. There may be other site specific circumstances in which the application of the detailed zoning provisions for both uses may prevent their combined development on one property.

Conversion of a Home Occupation to an On-Farm Business Use

While in principle it would be possible to convert a home occupation to an on-farm business use, such a conversion could not occur without Township approval. Such approval would be granted only if there was compliance with all applicable Zoning By-law provisions.

Unlike any other land use, on-farm business uses are required to obtain a Change of Use certificate from the Township. That requirement would also apply to a home occupation conversion proposal. Since the zoning provisions for an on-farm business use are more extensive and more rigorous than those for a home occupation, in some cases such a change of use may be difficult or impossible. Among the more important provisions of section 4.6 of the Zoning By-law that may adversely affect any such Change of Use application are those relating to minimum lot size, minimum lot frontage, the minimum separation distance between on-farm business uses and the buffering requirements.

Addressing the Concerns

In my opinion the concerns raised by Council cannot be addressed through the provisions of the Township's current planning documents or the Council adopted Official Plan. If the preference is to implement a specific prohibition on the combined development of a home occupation and an on-farm business use on any property, this can only be accomplished by a specific amendment to the Zoning By-law. It would preferable to simultaneously amend the current Official Plan. A request for an appropriate modification to the adopted Official Plan should also be made to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

Re: LysteGro Application as Bio–Fertilizer and Adherence to Biosolids By-Law 17-2002

We are pleased to provide the Township of Melancthon with our opinion of whether or not the provisions of Biosolids By-law 17-2002 should apply to the LysteGro product.

We agree that, in general, the application of biosolids to agricultural production areas is a socially responsible and environmentally sustainable method of nutrient addition and waste disposal provided that they are applied as recommended by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs and the Ministry of the Environment and Forestry.

However, with certification as a fertilizer by the Canadian Food and Inspection Agency (CFIA), the LysteGro product is not subject to the legislation enacted by the province of Ontario to regulate biosolid applications. Therefore, legislation such as The Nutrient Management Act O. Reg. 267/03 (NMA) that address issues related to biosolid applications such as maximum heavy metal concentrations, separation distances and nutrient management, do not apply to the LysteGro product. In this regard Mr. Kevin Litwiller of Lystek states that "It is true that the LysteGro product is registered at the federal level (CFIA) as a commercial fertilizer and, as such it falls under the Fertilizers Act and is <u>technically</u> only subject to the same set-back rules as any other commercial fertilizer product... However, as we are a company that believes in going "above and beyond", we have taken it upon ourselves



to develop the attached Best Management Practices and guidelines for application of LysteGro".

Virtually all residential water supply in Melanchton Township is derived from \leftarrow groundwater sources and other than for the Town of Shelbourne comprehensive water \leftarrow quality testing is not conducted. Thus protection of the aquifer is the best insurance against aquifer contamination. This protection is afforded by the By-law and provisions of the NMA.

The interest in protecting groundwater from contaminants commonly found in biosolids led the Township of Melancthon to enact By-law 17-2002. This By-law offers more protection of groundwater than the NMA. Through a scientific review and consultation with the public, the Township of Melancthon delineated suitable application areas within their geographical boundaries that are less vulnerable to impacts from the land application of a variety of nutrients and chemicals. These areas are recognized as 'low vulnerability aquifer' areas in the 2000 AEMOT Groundwater Management Study and found as Schedule 'A' in the By-law. In addition to identifying suitable application areas, the By-Law, by using minimum separation distances, excludes areas from biosolid applications that could lead to well contamination, surface water contamination or shallow groundwater contamination. The By-Law only applies to non-agricultural sourced materials (NASM's).

The By-Law does not apply to Agricultural Sourced Materials (ASM's) or commercial fertilizers. The implication of this is that nutrients, animal-derived-pathogens, veterinary pharmaceuticals and other chemicals entrained in ASM's can be applied within areas of the high vulnerability aquifer.

The By-Law, therefore, protects underlying aquifers from contaminants found within NASM's that could include;

- Heavy metals
- Variability in the concentrations of nutrients
- Pharmaceuticals and personal care products(PPCP's)
- Human derived bacteria and viruses

In regards to these concerns and the LysteGro product, we have the following comments;

Nutrient Content

In order to register as a fertilizer with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) Lystek has to guarantee a minimum nutrient content of their product but not a maximum nutrient content. The product is listed by the CFIA as being a 3-3-2 fertilizer (3% nitrogen, 3% phosphoric acid, 2 % soluble potash). Commercial fertilizers have financial incentive to just meet the specification whereas the LysteGro product has a





variable supply stream, and may not be able to control the content thereby exceeding the minimum specification. This introduces the potential for more nutrients (nitrogen, phosphorous, potassium) in the LysteGro product than listed in the CFIA specification¹. The environmental issue that could arise from this is the potential application of nutrients in excess of what the crop can utilize. Excess nutrients in the soil can be carried off of fields as suspended sediment and discharged to local waterways or be transported downward with infiltrating waters to the water table. Indeed OMAFRA clearly indicates these principles of nutrient management planning;

- 1. Know what you have.
- 2. Know what you need.
- 3. Know how much you are applying.

(http://www.omafra.gov.on.ca/english/nm/nasm/info/brochure.htm#8)

The salient question that was raised by one of the councilors at the Lystek site meeting was `Do you know what you have? `

On September 12, 2014, Mr. Litwiller from Lystek responded in this way to this issue:

"the end product is also tested on an ongoing basis and has been proven to be consistently reliable as a federally registered fertilizer product (CFIA) with predictable NPK values and concentrations of organic matter....apply only what is required and develop a nutrient management plan accordingly."

Lystek has an in-house agronomist who ensures that nutrient needs of the soils meet the nutrient characteristics of the Lystegro product.

Pharmaceutical and other Chemicals (Emerging Chemicals of Concern)

An area of growing concern in waste water treatment and land application of biosolids is the presence and persistence of pharmaceuticals and other chemicals in the environment. Other chemicals include hormones, anti-microbial compounds, personal care products, fire retardants, endocrine disruptors, plasticizers and artificial sweeteners. These are often called 'emerging chemicals of concern'. As an example of chemical persistence, researchers at the University of Waterloo are now using artificial sweeteners and their breakdown products as groundwater tracers because of their longevity in the environment.

Based on our understanding of the process patented by Lystek, these chemicals may persist in the bio-fertilizer product. These chemicals are also present in a traditional (those not undergoing the lysing process) biosolid but not in commercial fertilizers or manure (manure may include veterinary compounds). Some of these chemicals will

degrade readily in the soil environment or adhere to the soils and not move into the underlying aquifer. Others will persist with undetermined environmental consequences. Presently there are no regulations governing the application of such chemicals on farmland, however, it is possible that on-going research will result in future regulations if these chemicals are found to enter the food chain or are released to surface water or groundwater environments in harmful concentrations.

Pathogens

We are satisfied that the lysing process used by Lystek effectively neutralizes bacteria, viruses and living cells.

Heavy Metals

The Lystek process does not remove heavy metals from the LysteGro product stream. Therefore the concentrations of heavy metals in the final product will reflect those of the feed source. This is similar to traditional biosolids. The heavy metal concentrations listed in the LysteGro brochure do not exceed the maximum allowable metal concentrations for biosolids as listed by the Ontario Ministry for Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs. (OMAFRA).

As a check for compliance with the NMA we calculated the maximum allowable addition of heavy metals² per hectare for a five year period and based on an annual application of eight tonnes per hectare of LysteGro (maximum allowable by CFIA) for five consecutive years (Table I). After five applications the concentrations of copper and zinc would exceed allowable metal additions as stipulated by Section 98.0.12 (3) of the Act. The results are summarized in Table 1.

This suggests that a suitable rate of application of not more than once every two years must be established for the LysteGro product. We understand from Mr. Michael Dougherty an agronomist with Lystek (pers. Comm Sept. 25, 2014) that the maximum application rate would likely be once every three years as dictated by nutrient needs of the soils.

We also compared the maximum allowable concentrations of heavy metals in soils as listed in the NMA (Section 98.0.12 (3)) with those listed in Table 1 of Ontario Regulation 153/04 (Records of Site Condition). Table 1 of O.Reg. 153/04 is a list of typical background concentrations of chemicals in Ontario soils.

The comparison as shown on Table 2 is revealing in that in some instances, the maximum allowable heavy metal concentration for soils as listed in the NMA are less than those listed as typical background concentrations. This shows that some Ontario soils may already exceed recommended heavy metal concentrations for agricultural soils and therefore one would not be able to apply additional heavy metals according to the NMA. This observation confirms the need for heavy metal testing of soils prior to LysteGro applications.

From our review of the Fertilizer Act that governs commercial fertilizers such as LysteGro, there are no provisions for the testing of heavy metals in soils prior to applications. The environmental protection that we find in the Fertilizer Act is a prohibition of fertilizers containing;

(a) any substance in quantities likely to be generally detrimental or seriously injurious to vegetation (except weeds), domestic animals, public health or the environment when used according to directions;

(b) any substance that would, when applied in amounts commonly used or as specified in the directions for use, leave in the tissues of a plant a residue of a poisonous or harmful substance;



Separation Distances

Separation distances are required between points of application and sensitive receptors in order to prevent groundwater and surface water contamination. We have compared the separation distances recommended by the NMA, By-Law 17-2002 and the Best Management Practices prepared by Lystek for the LysteGro product. This comparison is in Table 3.

The separation distances suggested in the Lystek Best Management Practices generally follow the minimum allowable under the NMA.



Discussion

The By-law does not specify individual contaminants for which it was written but refers to the Environmental Protection Act which allows a municipality to enforce regulations where 'where a pollutant is spilled and causes or is likely to cause and adverse effect'. The recognition of sensitive aquifer conditions over which land applications of biosolids could have an adverse effect led the Township to enact By-Law 17-2002 thereby restricting biosolid applications to areas where adverse effects were unlikely to occur. An intent of the By-law was to prevent pathogenic bacteriological contamination of groundwater. Adverse impacts from pathogenic bacteria are known to occur from land applications of biosolids using the pathway of either land surface \rightarrow groundwater or land surface \rightarrow surface water. The lysing process patented by Lystek addresses this concern as pathogenic bacteria are neutralized in the process. Therefore with respect to environmental impacts from pathogenic bacteria, the LysteGro product need not be subject to By-law 17-2002.

Heavy metals were also likely a concern of the By-law considering the high sensitivity of the underlying aquifer. Our investigation suggests that provided that the application rate is no greater than once every two years, the allowable heavy metal application rate as stipulated by the NMA will not be exceeded. Lystek suggested that the rate would more likely be once every three years which satisfies this concern. However, the NMA does have heavy metal testing in the receiving soil as a requirement and stipulates both maximum allowable concentrations in the soil and maximum additions of heavy metals to soils.

Heavy metal concentrations may already naturally exceed those deemed acceptable for agricultural lands the NMA. The presence of heavy metals in LysteGro may therefore make it ineligible for applications to those soils. This justifies pre-testing of fields for heavy metals ad comparing to the maximum allowable as presented in the NMA.

Unlike the NMA, there are no explicit provisions in the Fertilizer Act that address accumulation of heavy metals in soils or maximum allowable heavy metals in soils.

The intent of the By-law was to identify areas where the movement of contaminants into the underlying aquifer was unlikely to occur. In the absence of the heavy metal testing regimen such recommended by the NMA, the applications of LysteGro may exceed the environmentally protective metrics provided in the NMA (e.g. maximum allowable heavy metal concentrations). Although LysteGro is exempt from the NMA, considering the hybrid nature of the product, we recommend that Lystek require testing for heavy metal accumulations in a similar testing manner as presented in the NMA. In the absence of this type of testing, LysteGro should be subject to the By-Law

The relatively recent recognition of the presence and persistence of other chemicals



including pharmaceutical compounds, hormones, fire retardants, artificial sweeteners, anti-microbial compounds, personal care products and plasticizers provides additional reason for the Township to be cautious in regards to the application of biosolids in sensitive groundwater environments. However, there is a lack of scientific evidence that emerging chemicals of concern in biosolids are a) mobile and recalcitrant enough to migrate through the soil zone and enter the groundwater system or surface water system or b) likely to do so in harmful concentrations. Therefore, it is not presently known if any of these chemicals *will cause or are likely to cause an adverse effect* once applied to the soil zone. As such, LysteGro should not be subject to the By-law at this time.

We are not aware of any jurisdiction that has banned biosolid applications solely on the basis of emerging chemicals of concern.

With respect to the variable nature of the source material, we are satisfied with the response given by Lystek, provided that the LysteGro product has regular testing (e.g. weekly) of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium and the testing results are used in the determination of application rates in conjunction with nutrient needs for individual applications. We understand that the in-house agronomist works with farmers receiving the LysteGro product to ensure appropriate rates of LysteGro are applied according to the crop needs.

With respect to other legislation, biosolids (that contain pathogens) are prohibited within 100 m of a municipal well and possibly within the two year time of travel (Well Head Protection Area B) depending on the vulnerability score of the underlying aquifer. These restrictions arise from the threat of pathogen movement to a well. Commercial fertilizers do not have the same restrictions and can be applied in a greater area within source water protection areas. The restrictions that do apply to commercial fertilizers are mainly due to nitrogen content in the fertilizer. We understand that although emerging chemicals of concern are discussed at the community level, there are no regulations within the Source Water Protection Act to limit their application in Well Head Protection Areas (WHPA's) at this moment in time (pers. Communication Martin Keller, GRCA).

Recommendations

The hybrid nature of the LysteGro product demands a hybrid approach to environmental protection. Mainly as a result of the absence of pathogens in the LysteGro product, it is our recommendation that LysteGro not be subject to By-Law 17-2002, but the Township should request that Lystek address the following recommendations in a manner that is satisfactory to the Township.



Separation Distance to Bedrock

Soils provide greater opportunity for natural attenuation of chemicals than the underlying dolostone bedrock, therefore in addition to the implicit requirement of 0.3 m of unsaturated soil above bedrock we recommend a minimum depth to bedrock of 100 cm as stipulated in Section 50 of the NMA for the unrestricted applications of all NASMs. The depth to bedrock in Melancthon is generally greater than one metre, therefore this restriction affects a small area of the Township.

Separation Distance to Water Table

It is our recommendation that there be a minimum separation distance of 0.9 metres between the depth of application and the water table (saturated soils). There are many beneficial bacteriological and chemical processes that occur in the unsaturated zone and therefore we encourage a separation greater than 0.3 metres. For example, where there is a water table at 0.3 metres, if LysteGro was applied at a depth of 0.10 m (4"), there would only be 0.20 m separating the injected material from the water table. Depending on the pressure applied during injection, precipitation following an application and soil type, the liquid fertilizer may pass thorough the remaining 0.20 m rapidly. The greater separation value also incorporates a safety factor with respect to seasonal variability in the determination of the position of the water table. The recommended 0.9 metre separation is based on unrestricted NASM applications as outlined in Section 49 of the NMA.

Heavy Metals Accumulation in Soils

It is our recommendation that similar restrictions as presented in the NMA Section 98.0.12 (3) in regards to maximum allowable concentrations of heavy metals in the soil and maximum additions of heavy metals to soils be complied with by the LysteGro product. This requires a regimen of soil testing for heavy metals prior to applications of LysteGro.

We've observed several of the culverts are in various stages of being reinstated, below are the requirements for the culverts in Melancthon Township Right of Ways:

- Maintain the conveyance of flow without creating adverse drainage impacts elsewhere.

- Maintain the natural stream pattern, culverts shall be aligned to the existing ditch line.

- Culverts should be placed to a depth equal to one tenth of the height or diameter of the culvert below the bottom of ditch.

- Slope along maintenance roads shall be a maximum of 3H:1V.
- Slope along roadway shall be a maximum of 2H:1V.
- Corrugated steel pipe culverts are to all be 600mm in diameter and 10m in length and centred to the access roads.
- Stabilize the slopes with either grass seed, sod, or rip rap stone.
- Minimum Longitudinal Slope of 0.3 percent
- Base Width of ditch desirable standard: 1.0 metre and minimum standard: zero (V-ditch)

Hi Denise

I am enclosing a copy of our design for guide rails on the 4th Line. Please take a good look at the drawing as it may differ from expectations. With a road speed of 80km/hr there is fairly lengthy distance where a car could potentially leave the roadway and require protection. Guiderail lengths also increase when the road is narrow and there is not enough shoulder to push the rails back from the travelling lane. And we have to make sure the guiderail itself is not a hazard to errant vehicles so end protection is required.

The south guiderail is approximately 135 m in length and has extruders at each end. Note that it is located right at the edge of the existing gravel. This may cause issues with snow removal and grader operations. We would try to field fit it little further back when we get to installation, but there is no guarantee that would work. Craig should be consulted relative to the impact on snow removal and grading operations. Unless the snow is all plowed to the west, it is possible that snow could start to accumulate inside the guiderail. That could effectively narrow the road and place oncoming vehicles closer to each other.

The north guiderail is much shorter - about 30 m in total length. This was the only option for this location because of the location of two field entrances that could not be blocked. This rail is also shown very close to the existing road and would pushed back a little if possible during installation.

You may ask why the south guiderail couldn't be shortened down to the same length as the northern one. The answer is because the greater length and use of extruder ends offers the most protection and is therefore preferred when possible. It was only because of the field entrances that an alternative had to be used in the northern area. However, if there are similar concerns with the southern rail causing snow blockage or otherwise creating risk by reducing separation of passing vehicles, you may want to consider alternatives, such as making the southern system the same as the northern one. We can meet with you to discuss this if it would help.

The approximate cost of installing the guiderails according to our design would be \$36,000, assuming that there are no conflicts with underground utilities. Dufferin Windpower have already agree to pay for this work, but they may have done so on an assumption of lower costs. It would be prudent to inform them of estimated costs before commissioning the work.

There is more to this than may have been expected. Please let me know if a telephone conversation would help to sort it out.....gf
