

MELANCTHON TOWNSHIP POLICE SERVICES BOARD



WHO ARE WE AND WHAT WE DO:

The Melancthon Police Service Board is a Board required and created pursuant to Section 10 of the Police Services Act, a statute of the Province of Ontario. The Act requires that any municipality with a contract for police services with the Ontario Provincial Police have a Police Service Board. As the Township has such a contract with the OPP for services provided by the Dufferin detachment our Board functions.

The Board is composed of three members, one being a member of municipal council, one being a member of the community appointed by municipal council and one member appointed by the Province. The Board is not a committee of municipal council as it is created by statute, has its own statutory mandate, code of conduct and procedure for administration.

The Board mandate is to address policing issues within the municipality, including addressing the adequacy of the police services, and to monitor the performance of the detachment commander of the Dufferin OPP. The Board coordinates with the other municipal Police Service Boards served by the Dufferin detachment when necessary to address matters of mutual concern.

The *Police Services Act* and Regulations prescribe certain duties and responsibilities for each Police Service Board, including:

- a. determining, after consultation with the Detachment Commander, the objectives and priorities for the delivery of police services. This includes establishing a three year Action Plan to set forth policing priorities;
- b. local policies, after consultation with the Detachment Commander, for the management of policing;
- c. participation in the selection of the Detachment Commander;
- d. monitor the performance of the Detachment Commander;
- e. monitor the administration of the complaint system maintained by the OPP.

The Board, through its Municipal Council Representative, is the channel for communication with Municipal Council and the Chair of the Board will meet with Council, and vice versa, to address any questions relating to Police Services.

The Board is required to meet at least four times per calendar year, all meetings being open to the Public. The Board causes its agenda for meetings and the minutes from such meetings to be posted

to the Township website. The Board has its own procedural policy for the conduct of business, a copy can be found at the link at the top of the PSB web page.

WHAT WE ARE NOT:

The Police Services Board is not a complaints bureau, and nor is Municipal Council. We are not the point of first contact if members of the community have an issue/complaint about a police officer or about the provision of services by the Dufferin OPP.

If a resident has a complaint, then the issue must and should be dealt with direct with the Dufferin OPP through its protocol, including direct with the Detachment Commander. If the resident, having addressed the complaint with the local Detachment continues to have a complaint then the matter should be addressed with the Independent Police Review Board. MELANCTHON POLICE SERVICE ACTION PLAN:

2014-16 OPP Action Plan, with status report as of 2015 is posted on our PSB section.

The Melancthon Police Service Board as appointed in December, 2014 has been making every effort to meet its mandate for and within the Township. In June, 2015 we initiated with Municipal Council a public community meeting in Horning's Mills and we followed this with a community meeting held in Corbetton in October, 2015. The Board has been proactive in seeking to address matters of community policing and safety as it has worked with Council to facilitate information exchange that will assist both the Board and Council in serving the residents of Melancthon, including issues of speeding and property safety. As a result of the Board's initiative and initial design in September, 2016 the OPP have produced an information

brochure addressing traffic safety focused on speeding titled Could You Stop, a copy of which can be found below.

The Action Plan for the three year period of 2017-19 is in the process of being compiled.

SPEEDING AND AGGRESSIVE DRIVING Speeding and aggressive driving are

dangerous and are one of the leading causal factors in fatal motor vehicle collisions investigated by the OPP.

In 2015, 61 people died on OPP patrolled roads in which speeding was a causal factor in the collision.

Speeding, following too closely, making unsafe lane changes and failing to yield right-of-way are all forms of aggressive driving that place road users at risk.



INATTENTIVE DRIVERS

Don't be a passenger of a distracted driver. Recognize that they are endan-

gering your life. Speak up and insist that they focus on the road and on safe driving. By not doing so, you are contributing to the problem.



REDUCE YOUR RISK

If an animal jumps out in front of you, do not swerve, but brake quickly.

Be especially alert at dusk and dawn when visibility can be reduced; 90 percent of collisions with animals occur at these times.

Deer activity peaks from October to December; nearly half of deer collisions occur during these months.

DUFFERIN OPP

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THINK ABOUT YOUR VEHICLE STOPPING DISTANCE AS IT RELATES TO YOUR SPEED.

The stopping distance is the distance your car travels from the moment you realize you must brake to the moment the car stops.

YOUR STOPPING DISTANCE DEPENDS ON A NUMBER OF FACTORS WHICH INCLUDE:

- How fast you are going
- Whether you are travelling on level ground, uphill or downhill
- The weather dry roads mean shorter braking distances, wet and icy roads mean longer braking distances
- The condition of the road
- The condition of the car and tires
- Your reaction time when applying the brakes

The following diagram shows the overall stopping distances at a variety of speeds when the road surface is dry. When the road is wet, the stopping distance is twice the distance; on icy roads, the stopping distance is ten times the distance.

THINKING DISTANCE

The time it takes you to think about stopping and hit the brakes.

32km/h = 40ft / 3 car lengths



64km/h = 118ft / 9 car lengths



 $\frac{96}{8}$ km/h = $\frac{240}{18}$ t / $\frac{18}{18}$ car lengths



BRAKING DISTANCE

The time it takes for the car to come to a stop after you have applied the brakes.

48km/h = 75ft / 6 car lengths



80km/h = **175**ft / **13** car lengths



112km/h = 315ft / 24 car lengths



CHARACTERISTICS OF FATAL COLLISIONS INVOLVING SPEEDING:



40% of speeding drivers involved in fatal crashes were 16 to 24 years of age



MOST drivers killed in speed-related crashes were the ones speeding



80% of young adult passengers who were killed in a speeding crash were in the vehicle with a speeding driver of similar age



Single-vehicle crashes accounted for more than 50% of speeding deaths and serious injuries



1 IN 3 speeding drivers involved in a fatal crash had been drinking

DUFFERIN OPP-INVESTIGATED MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISIONS

Between 2011 and 2015, Dufferin OPP investigated over **3,500** motor vehicle collisions.

This included 28 fatal collisions and over 650 collisions in which vehicle occupants were injured and required medical attention.
